

# Energy storage cooling Serbia

How many MW of battery storage will be developed in Serbia?

Up to 200 MW of battery storage will be developed across the sites. Image: Ministry of Mining and Energy, Tanjug Plans for 1 GW of new solar in Serbia are set to go ahead after the signing of an implementation agreement.

Does Serbia have a solar project?

The contract is the latest in a line of solar projects backed by Serbia's Ministry of Mining and Energy this year, which includes plans for a 1 GW solar panel factory and another 500 MW of solar. Figures from the International Renewable Energy Agency state Serbia had deployed a total 137 MW of solar by the end of last year.

What is Serbia's energy investment plan?

The Ministry of Mining and Energy has announced a EUR15 billion investment plan for the electricity sector in next several years, expecting to reach more than 3 GW of renewable energy production plants. The main players and investors in the Serbian Energy Sector are:

Is solar a good option for Serbia?

A statement published on the Serbian government's website says solar is the most optimal solution to quickly reach large capacities from green sources, without burdening and endangering the stability of the transmission network. Serbia currently gets more than 60% of its electricity from fossil fuels.

What percentage of Serbia's electricity comes from coal?

Serbia's national power utility Electric Power of Serbia (EPS) produces nearly 70 percent of the country's electricity from coal and nearly 27% percent from hydropower, with approximately 4% coming from private developers in wind and solar energy. Serbia heavily subsidizes coal and electricity prices, inhibiting competition.

How much power does Serbia have?

It currently has a total capacity of approximately 3490 megawatts (MW) of renewables, with 2342 MW in hydropower in 2019 according to the European Energy Community. Serbia announced plans to install new hydropower plants and two existing dams, and to rehabilitate a further 15 existing power plants totaling around 30 MW with EBRD financing.

With the proposed amendments to the Law on the Use of Renewable Energy Sources, Serbia will promote the introduction of energy storage facilities, Minister of Mining and Energy Dubravka ?edovi? said.

The level of energy efficiency in Serbia is quite low, as electricity consumption per unit of living space is about 200 kWh in Serbia, compared to an average of about 140 kWh in the EU. Energy efficiency experts

estimate that energy efficiency measures could result in energy savings of 30-40 percent.

The Serbian Government has approved the development of a spatial plan for constructing large-capacity self-balancing solar power plants paired with battery energy storage systems. This ambitious initiative will encompass areas in the cities of Zajecar and Leskovac, as well as the municipalities of Bujanovac, Lebane, Negotin, and Odzaci.

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The Serbian government is seeking a strategic partner to develop at least five PV plants with a cumulative capacity of 1 GW/1.2 GWdc and at least 200 MW/400 MWh of battery energy storage.

Fortis Energy has announced the acquisition of a significant 180 MW (AC) solar project with an integrated Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) in Sremska Mitrovica, Serbia. This solar power plant, which will also feature a substantial energy storage system, is set to become one of the largest of its kind in Southeast Europe.

The project, to be owned and operated by Serbia's state power utility Elektroprivreda Srbije (EPS), boasts a total installed capacity exceeding 1 GW, with a 200 MW/400 MW/h battery storage component.
