The procurement of the 40 MW solar photovoltaic (PV) projectin Eswatini is now at the bid submission stage (when the bids are submitted by the bidders).

What is Eswatini's first solar tender?

Formerly known as Swaziland, the Kingdom of Eswatini issued its first utility-scale solar tender in June. It aims to increase the share of renewables in the country's electricity mix to 50% by 2030.

What is Eswatini Energy Regulatory Authority (Esera)?

The Eswatini Energy Regulatory Authority (ESERA) has begun the process of procuring new generating capacity from independent power producers, with the support of Eswatini's Ministry of Natural Resources and Energy (MNRE).

This follows announcement last month by ESERA of its intention to award contracts to preferred bidders for 75MW Solar PV generation capacities in line ...

The project, touted as the largest one of its kind in Africa, envisages the installation of the solar farm at the Edwaleni hydropower plant (HPP) in Matsapha, central Eswatini. Planned to span an area of 45 ha (111 acres), it will be equipped with 75,000 PV panels to produce more than 100 million kWh of electricity annually.

As the first utility scale renewable IPPs in Eswatini, these projects will help stabilise the cost of electricity supply and increase the country's energy resilience, acting as a strong driver for growth and playing a part in the economic recovery following the COVID-19 pandemic."

Independent power producer (IPP) Globeleq and its consortium partner, Sturdee Energy Southern Africa, have been selected as the preferred bidder to develop 30 MW of solar projects in the Kingdom of Eswatini.

This comes after Eswatini Energy Regulatory Authority (ESERA) published its intention to award contracts to

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preferred bidders for 75MW solar PV generation capacities in line with Section 26 of the Electricity Act of 2007.

The solar farm is under development by Frazium Energy, a subsidiary of the Frazer Solar Group, an Australian-German conglomerate. The energy off-taker is Eswatini Electricity Company (EEC), the national electricity utility parastatal company, under a 40-year power purchase agreement

Eswatini has an installed and operating capacity of 71MW which is owned and operated by the Eswatini Electricity Company (EEC) against 234MW peak demand ¹. The installed capacity includes about 60.4 MW hydropower as well as about 10 MW solar PV that is coupled to a 1 MW battery storage system.

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
